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A New Executive Director for The Jefferson County Chamber

The Chamber is proud to announce that we have hired a new Executive Director, Arlene Alen. Arlene will step up as our Executive Director, effective April 1. Arlene is currently the president and CEO of the Chino Valley Area Chamber of Commerce & Visitors Center in Arizona - a position she has held since 2014 - where she is responsible for economic development, marketing, tourism, community leadership, media and government relations, and placemaking.

Alen's work in placemaking will be an especially exciting addition to the Chamber's core commitment to building a thriving a resilient Jefferson County economy and community.

In 2015, Alen was named to the International Placemaking Leadership Council. She joined this cross-disciplinary group of Placemakers working in many diverse contexts in 55 countries worldwide all of whom share the passion and expertise

Marine Trades Association and owner of Admiral Ship Supply. He started his professional career with Kinko's Copies where he rose through the company

and eventually worked in store management. Over thirteen years he used Kinko's nationwide status to move to multiple cities including Madison WI, Minneapolis MN, San Francisco CA and Portland OR. He benefited from their rehiring policy to take leave to enjoy nine bicycle tours, exploring Europe, the western U.S., Canada and Alaska. Robert first came to Port Townsend (by bicycle) in the summer of 1993. He decided to make his home here in the spring of 2003.

Robert found employment at Admiral Ship Supply and immediately fell in love with the work performed by the various craftsmen of the shipyard. In 2005 he left the shipyard to become the Office Manager at Alaska Power and Telephone in Glen Cove. In 2007 he was promoted to Human Resources Administrator. In this role he oversaw all aspects of personnel administration including employment law and employee benefits. He also served as the Plan Administrator and Secretary of the company's Employee Ownership Savings Plan Board of Trustees which oversaw company's retirement plan.

Robert and his wife Anna purchased Admiral Ship Supply in February of 2015 coming full circle to his original employer in Port Townsend and fulfilling his desire to return to the shipyard. Admiral Ship Supply is an integral part of maritime activities in our working waterfront. He and his wife Anna are involved in various activities with the Northwest Maritime Center and the Northwest School of Wooden Boat Building.

Port Townsend Cycle School

Want to learn about bikes? Wheel and frame building? Suspension systems? Electric bikes? Bike restoration? Wooden bikes? Frame painting? Want to become a certified bike mechanic? Now you can do it all right here in our community.

The PT Cycle School is a new business under a non-profit umbrella that runs the Jefferson County ReCyclery – the Community Arts & Recreation Alliance. We are a world-class educational center for all things related to cycling for folks from around the region and beyond. We commit to training both young and old, with partial or full scholarships for 30% of our students.

By 2020 we will train over 400 students with over 30 courses per year. Wheel building classes will start this spring at the PT School for the Arts in the Fort Worden “Makers’ Square”, while we search for a temporary dedicated space and then a permanent location. We will partner with school districts and other local businesses.

Like any nonprofit startup, we need community support:

1. A 2,000 sf space to rent by September 2018,
2. Donations, sponsors and loans for \$25,000 in capital expenses (bike stands, etc.), and
3. Ideas and help from local riders and other cycle enthusiasts.

PUD

Jefferson County Public Utility District

The PUD is excited to join the Jefferson County Chamber of Commerce and looks forward to working with other local public and private agencies to increase community connection and vitality.

Jefferson County PUD is your local power, public water, sewer, and broadband utility. Originally organized in 1939, Jefferson PUD is one of only 28 current PUDs in Washington.

In 2013, the PUD purchased electric service from the private utility serving eastern Jefferson County. The PUD now serves over 19,000 electric, 4,400 water and 300 sewer customers spread over 475 square miles.

The PUD operates as a government entity with a 3-member Board of Commissioners elected to alternating six year terms. In the last five years the PUD has gone from 8 to 50 employees. Its operations center is located on 4 Corners Road, with additional offices in Chimacum. Kevin Streett is the Assistant General Manager.

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
