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

Organic Seed Alliance (OSA) is a Port Townsend-based nonprofit organization and a national leader in research, education and advocacy on organic seed. Chris Witkowski's art is a beautiful celebration of the seed and biodiversity OSA is working to grow.

The Leader

Seed is part of our common cultural heritage – a living, natural resource that demands careful management to meet food needs now and into the future. Increasing both access to and use of organic seed that can be saved, improved and adapted to changing environmental and market conditions will add resiliency to our regional food supply.

Each year OSA educates thousands of farmers on seed production and crop improvement, conducts organic plant breeding research at our farm in Chimacum and other farms across the country, and advocates for national policies that strengthen organic agriculture. Our online publications, webinars and digital resources are used by farmers everywhere.

Join OSA at our Finnriver-based research farm in September for our Community Field Day and support our work to build a resilient regional seed system in Jefferson County through a new Seed

Center project to be launched in 2020. For events and announcements, visit seedalliance.org and sign-up for our quarterly newsletter.







ABOUT THE PUD

Jefferson County Public Utility District No. 1 was founded in 1939 as part of the Grange movement to electrify rural communities in WA state. However, Jefferson PUD did not enter the utilities business until 1981, when it acquired its first water district in the community of Gardiner. More water systems followed, as did community drain fields for septic systems. For more than 25 years following that acquisition, Jefferson County PUD operated as a small water and septic district with less than ten employees and a budget of \$2 million dollars or less.

In 2008, the citizens of Jefferson County approved a ballot measure authorizing the PUD to pursue the acquisition of the county's electrical grid from the privately held Bellevuebased Puget Sound Energy (PSE).

In 2019, the PUD began working to expand its operations and customer service facility. A remodeled and modernized office will reopen in 2021, bringing together all employees and the board of commissioners in one location for the first time since entering the power business.

The PUD is also focusing on bringing broadband internet to underserved and unserved areas of Jefferson County.



NO END-TO-END ROAD

Travelers must go through at least one other county to reach the coastal side of Jefferson County, because the center of the county is occupied by the Olympic Mountain Range.


JEFFERSON COUNTY HAS THREE DISTINCT SECTIONS:


The Populated East; Pus Federal Lands In The Center; And The Wild West

Jefferson County has three distinct sections: the populated East Jefferson County, the federal lands stretching across the county's center, most of which is wild Olympic land, and the sparsely populated West Side.

The entire county only has one incorporated city, which is also the county seat: Port Townsend.
East Jefferson County is mostly made up of small communities, such as the Tri-Area towns of Port Hadlock, Chimacum, and Irondale, Quilcene, Brinnon, Cape George, Kala Point, Dabob Bay, Marrowstone Island and others.

On the West Side, the Pacific Ocean buffets the small communities south of Forks, including Oil City, Clearwater and Queets—although most of the area is made up of wild rainforest and rocky, scenic beaches.





PORT OF PORT TOWNSEND

In 1792, Captain George Vancouver sailed his ship, the HMS Discovery inland from Cape Flattery, putting into Discovery Bay for repairs. While in the area, he observed what his log describes as a "very safe and capacious harbour," which he named Port Townsend in honor of his friend, the first Marquis of Townshend.

But Port Townsend's maritime history dates back to before Vancouver's "discovery," to when the Native American tribes, including the Jamestown S'Klallam who once lived in what is now downtown Port Townsend, traveled by canoe and fishing in Port Townsend Bay.

This heritage is kept alive today by the Port of Port Townsend and the many boatbuilders, fishers and artisan tradespeople who continue to come to Port Townsend for its maritime culture.

The Port of Port Townsend was established under the Washington State laws of 1911 by election on November 4, 1924. Today, its mission is to serve the citizens of Jefferson County by maintaining and developing property and facility to promote sustainable economic growth, provide community access to marinas and port facilities, and to protect and maintain the community's maritime heritage.



Chetzemoka trail opened with ceremony June 29, 2019

Followed by dedication of Welcome Pole at Maritime Center

The Chetzemoka Trail, an interpretive trail highlighting 18 historically significant sites throughout Port Townsend, opened with a ceremony at Memorial Athletic Field at 1 p.m. on June 29, 2019

The celebration was immediately followed by a dedication of the Welcome Pole at the Northwest Maritime Center.

The trail, a project of the Native Connections Action Group of the Quimper Unitarian Universalist Fellowship, in partnership with the Jamestown S'Klallam Tribe, is intended to educate the public on the relationship between the S'Klallam people who had lived for hundreds of years in what was once called "qatáy," and the European settlers who arrived in Port Townsend in the mid-19th century.

At each site, signs offer historic information about Chief Chetzemoka (pronounced Cheech-ma-han; later changed by settlers to Chetzemoka) and the S'Klallam people of the 19th century, as well as

the impact of the arrival of European give information about the historical settlers and connections to present-day significance of each site, offering an opportunity for both locals and tourists

The trail follows the life of Chief Chetzemoka, who is one of the best remembered S'Klallam leaders because he befriended the early Port Townsend settlers and helped the S'Klallam negotiate the difficult changes in their lifeways.

"Settlers and the indigenous peoples of the North Olympic Peninsula area have worked diligently to coexist and develop respectful relations despite their cultural differences," wrote Ron Allen, Tribal Council Chairman with the Jamestown S'Klallam Tribe in a message about the new trail. "Chief Chetzemoka played a key role in establishing this relationship in the 19th century. ... Today in the 21st century, our S'Klallam and sister Tribes continue to strive to work together to solve problems in a complex society, respecting the values of both the indigenous and the non-indigenous populations of the area."

The trail will divide into three different loops: a 3-mile loop, a 6-mile loop, and a 12-mile loop. The 3-mile loop is easily walkable and features downtown historical sites, such as Point Hudson, Memorial Field and the Fowler Building.

The 6-mile loop extends west to Kai Tai Lagoon and Laurel Grove Cemetery, whereas the 12-mile loop goes all the way out to North Beach County Park and Fort Worden. The trail is walkable and bikeable with elevation changes and some steep uphill and downhill grades, but is also driveable.

Along the way, signs

give information about the historical significance of each site, offering an opportunity for both locals and tourists to learn more about the people who lived in Port Townsend, or qatáy, before white settlers arrived. It also offers a perspective on Chetzemoka's decision to seek peace between the S'Klallam people and the white settlers.

The partnership that Chetzemoka forged back in the 1800s is still alive today. An example of this is the Welcome Pole that was donated to the Northwest Maritime Center by the Jamestown S'Klallam Tribe. Carpenter Dale Faulstich designed the new totem pole, which features the Supernatural Carpenter, the Spirit of Western Red Cedar, Chetzemoka, and Sentinel Rock.

"This is the latest manifestation of a relationship between the Northwest Maritime Center and the Jamestown S'Klallam Tribe that is probably about 15 years old now," said Jake Beattie, executive director of the Northwest Maritime Center. "Even during the initial fundraising efforts to secure a place for the Maritime Center, the tribe was involved." Beattie said the Maritime Center is honored to receive such a gift. It will be placed outside of the Chandlery, on the intersection of Monroe and Water Street. "It's really profound how something like this can provoke all of us to think about who we are in relation to this place," Beattie said. "It helps us more completely conceive how we can be better informed, to think about the connections of humans to this place that happened before 1850." The dedication of the Welcome Pole took place after the celebration of the trail at the Northwest Maritime Center.


